A few words from Fr Nuku

Today's readings give us some important ideas of the nature of the Church. In the first reading, it reminds us of the fact that the Church is made up of people, humans, who are suspicious of others, yet with the power and guidance of the Holy Spirit, they can change and live in peace. The psalm gives some important characteristics that relate to the Church. The second reading warns faithful people that having a relationship with Jesus is more than knowledgeable agreement to statements of faith. And in the gospel passage, we listen to Jesus' Last Supper Discourse, in which He speaks of Himself as the source of life and the strength for those who longing to bear the fruits that God intends them to produce.

I believe that scripture refers to the Church as an edifice with Jesus as the cornerstone, the Apostles as the foundation, and each member as part of the structure. However, it is important to know that Church is not only a physical building but an edifice, a building of living, human beings. Jesus is not only the cornerstone but He is the life-sustaining vine through each of us (the branches) receive what we need to produce fruit. The living image of the Church is more important and powerful, since it speaks of the fruit that we are called to produce. This reminds us that we are called to be part of life-giving process that begins with our being joined to Jesus.

On the other hand, being religious is more than a personal relationship with God. That relationship with the Lord Jesus is unconditionally vital. As we re-bind ourselves to the Lord Jesus, however, we have to rebind ourselves to all others who are linked with Jesus. We have no life without our relationship with Jesus, His Father, and the Holy Spirit. Yet, that leads to being united with others. We are challenged to gather together in the name of the Lord Jesus, to edify and build up each other as we praise God together. From the one vine, the branches must branch out and spread to the whole world, to all the families of the nations.

We are part of the living community of faith that stretches beyond time and physical space. We must continue to produce fruit so that others will join with us in the praise of the One who is the Vine Grower. By the Good News of our fruitful lives, people will want to be a part of the Assembly of God's people. Our actions should be so encouraging and inviting that others will want to be grafted onto the Vine and receive the same life-giving nourishment that leads to the praise of the Lord God. May we always echo today's psalm response and say, "I will praise You, LORD, in the assembly of your people." Fr Nuku

'MAKE YOUR HOME IN ME' FIRST R

The juxtaposition of the story of Saul (Paul) in the first reading from Acts with the image of Jesus as the vine in the Gospel speaks to the formation of disciples of Jesus. In Acts we have a glimpse into the beginnings of Saul's (not yet called Paul) ministry who, with all the zeal of his experience of the risen Christ, joins the believers. Barnabus takes him under his wing. Trouble erupts with the Hellenists and Paul is whisked away from Jerusalem to his hometown to where he contemplates his call.

When we then hear the Gospel's beautifully elegant description of the vine and the branches we can connect with the formation of the disciples and discern our own call. The clear instruction is 'to make your home in me', to make our home in Jesus. It is a symbiotic relationship just like the vine and its branches. We need to remain/abide in Jesus to bear fruit. No matter our zeal, our life of faith and ministry grows and flows from Jesus. This is further enriched by the words of the second reading from the First Letter of John where we hear that 'our love is not to be just words or mere talk but something real and active'. We are to live the life God wants, to love one another and live in God.

Vines and their fruit are no stranger to us here in Australia, so we take time to reflect on this image to see how closely we abide in Jesus the vine.

FIRST READING

Acts 9: 26-31

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

He explained how the Lord appeared to Saul and spoke to him on his journey.

When Saul got to Jerusalem he tried to join the disciples, but they were all afraid of him: they could not believe he was really a disciple. Barnabas, however, took charge of him, introduced him to the apostles, and explained how the Lord had appeared to Saul and spoken to him on his journey, and how he had preached boldly at Damascus in the name of Jesus. Saul now started to go round with them in Jerusalem, preaching fearlessly in the name of the Lord. But after he had spoken to the Hellenists, and argued with them, they became determined to kill him. When the brothers knew, they took him to Caesarea, and sent him off from there to Tarsus.

The churches throughout Judaea, Galilee and Samaria were now left in peace, building themselves up, living in the fear of the Lord, and filled with the consolation of the Holy Spirit.



SECOND READING 1 Jn 3: 18-24 A reading from the first letter of St John.

His commandments are these: that we believe and that we love one another.

My children, our love is not to be just words or mere talk, but something real and active; only by this can we be certain that we are the children of the truth and be able to quieten our conscience in his presence, whatever accusations it may raise against us, because God is greater than our conscience and he knows everything. My dear people, if we cannot be condemned by our conscience, we need not be afraid in God's presence, and whatever we ask him, we shall receive, because we keep his commandments and live the kind of life that he wants. His commandments are these: that we believe in the name of his Son Iesus Christ and that we love one another as he told us to. Whoever keeps his commandments lives in God and God lives in him. We know that he lives in us by the Spirit that he has given us.
